since that time. I'll write to him and ask him to host you in his house for about a week." About two weeks later my father got a letter from Ryu. He said in his letter, "I am very happy to host your daughter, Yukio. There are seven people in my family. They will be happy to host your daughter from Japan. () We will welcome her." I was happy to receive this answer. Then my father said, "Ryu is a kind and wonderful person. You can learn a lot from him. He works at a post office now." I thought, "Today is June 16th. According to Ryu's letter, I have only forty-five days to prepare for the trip. I'll be busy from tomorrow."
Forty-five days passed and August 1st came. I left Japan on that day. I was on a plane for three hours. office now. I will go to some villages to carry letters to people tomorrow. How about coming with me? You'll have to stay on the mountain for three days. (a) " I said, "OK, Ryu. I'll go with you." The next morning, we left our house at six o'clock. About an hour later, we were walking along a mountain road. Ryu
walked very fast. It was not easy to follow him. We came to the first village at about eleven o'clock and met about twenty people. They looked happy to receive their letters. One family gave us two cups of tea at lunch time. We had our lunches prepared by Ryu's wife. People in the village brought their lunches to a park. We ate lunch together and talked a lot there. One thing I knew at that time was their friendly way of life. (b) That made me very happy. We started our trip again after lunch. (ウ) The family made dinner for us. I usually watch TV when I have
dinner in Japan but they didn't. Talking with each other made the dinner wonderful. We enjoyed it very much. It was quiet outside. I thought, "I walked a lot and am very tired but now I am very happy. I have never felt peaceful like this in Japan. Why am I peaceful here? Probably because (\pm)." I went to bed after dinner. Ryu said to me that night, "Mako, we will arrive at our final village at about six o'clock tomorrow evening. We will stay there tomorrow night and then go down the mountain. Are you all right?" "Oh, I'm OK, Ryu. I'll do my best tomorrow." We started at seven the next morning. On that day we visited three more villages. We came to the third village at
about ten o'clock in the morning. Fifteen people welcomed us. We gave each of them their letters. They welcomed us and talked with us about many things. I was happy under the blue sky. A few birds were flying in the sky. I thought, "Time goes slowly and every living thing is enjoying a peaceful life. I've never felt like this." Then at two in the afternoon we came to the fourth village. The village was about 3,000 meters high and it was a little cold. All the people there were happy to receive their letters. We stayed in the village for about two hours. I was still very tired and thought it was difficult to visit one more village on that day. (c) This was strange to me because I did not live to make
other people happy in Japan. The fifth village was higher than the fourth village. I thought I couldn't walk but Ryu helped me. We arrived at the fifth village at about seven o'clock in the evening. It was already dark. Seven people waited for us. (d) Tears ran down on my face. The old woman said to me, "You can stay at my house with Ryu this evening." I said, "Oh, thank

When we had dinner at night, I said to her, "Why do you live alone here?" She said, "My family left this place and went to a town. They asked me to come and live with them but I love this place. I was born and brought up here. All things here are good memories and important to me. I cannot change my way of life." Before going to bed, (太) wrote a few things in my notebook. When I went to bed, I couldn't find my comb. I thought, "I lost my comb when I walked."

It was a beautiful day the next morning. When we were leaving the village, a man from the fourth village came to us and said, "Excuse me. Is this your comb?" I said, "Yes, but where did you find it?" He said, "I found this in my house last night. I am very happy to give this comb back to you." I couldn't believe it when I heard these words from him. I thought, "He walked for many hours this morning to give back this comb. I would like to be kind like him." This is another thing I learned here. We can believe in people's goodness. With these good memories, I went back to Ryu's house on that day.
